SCHOOL CHARACTERISTICS

Las Lomas, one of four schools in the Acalanes Union High School District, is a 4-year comprehensive high school with an enrollment of approximately 1489 students including 330 seniors. The school day is seven periods of 50 minutes each. All classes meet five days a week during two 18-week semesters. Las Lomas offers a strong college preparatory program. The student body reflects the community's diverse socioeconomic and educational levels. The ethnic/ racial makeup of our student population is 3% African-American, 11% Hispanic, 13% Asian, 3% Filipino, 69% Caucasian, 1% other. Approximately 5.6% of our students are enrolled in English language development classes. Las Lomas was named a 2008 No Child Left Behind-Blue Ribbon School, one of only 55 public high schools in the United States and one of 11 in California to receive this honor. In 2011, Las Lomas received a full six year accreditation from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). Las Lomas continually receives acknowledgement as one of the top 10% academically achieving schools in California.

COMMUNITY CHARACTERISTICS

Las Lomas is located in Walnut Creek, a suburban community of 64,200 located in the San Francisco Bay Area. Parents are primarily employed in Walnut Creek, San Ramon, Oakland or San Francisco. Demonstrating the commitment to Las Lomas in the current challenging economic environment, the Walnut Creek Education Foundation was formed to raise funds to supplement our strong academic programs. Additional parent groups and foundations contribute to an environment for academic success. A partnership grant from the city of Walnut Creek funds a part-time crisis counselor.

FACULTY AND STAFF

The Las Lomas teaching staff is comprised of 74 full-time equivalent highly qualified faculty members, in addition to 3 administrators, 4.5 counselors, a psychologist, and a librarian, plus a part-time speech/language specialist/504 coordinator, nurse, testing coordinator and college/ career advisor. The counseling case load is approximately 331:1.

STUDENT PROGRAMS

- Vocational training classes are offered through the Regional Occupational Program (ROP).
- Extracurricular programs, which offer opportunities to develop students' unique interests and leadership skills, include student government, Safe School Ambassadors, California Scholarship Federation (Palladians), peer tutoring, plus a wide variety of clubs and activities.
- Acalanes Gifted and Talented Education (AGATE) is a selective program
 where a limited number of students conduct interdisciplinary projects
 that require both primary and secondary research skills, three days
 hands on exploration and a culminating presentation of the research
 project presented in creative, non-traditional formats.
- Competitive Academic Decathlon and Model UN teams.
- Award winning visual and performing arts programs.
- Instrumental Music Department performing groups hold a reputation for musical excellence, consistently receiving the highest accolades at music festivals throughout California and abroad. Students are well represented in regional and California all-state honor bands.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students must earn at least 240 course credits. Five units of credit per semester are granted in all courses when a passing grade is earned. Course requirements include:

A senior project in English 4 is an additional graduation requirement. The senior project is a year-long research project, culminating in a written report and an oral presentation. Students must pass the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) to receive a diploma.

GRADING

Letter grades are assigned a numerical value as follows (D is a passing grade): A = 4, B = 3, C = 2, D = 1, F = 0

The cumulative GPA is the average of all courses since the beginning of the ninth grade. Honors courses are designated "Honors" and Advanced Placement courses are designated "AP." College prep courses are indicated on the transcript with a "P" and meet the University of California A-G requirements. Non-college prep courses are marked with an "m" or "n" at the end of the course code, indicating the curriculum was modified and the course does not fulfill University of California A-G requirements. Pluses and minuses will appear on student transcripts but will not be used in computing grade point averages. Final transcripts reflect weighted and unweighted averages.

CLASS RANK

Las Lomas no longer reports class rank to colleges. We have long been concerned with the inequities which occur when reporting specific rank in a highly motivated, talented student body. We will be happy to help any college or university interpret our statistics.

As a member of the Diablo Foothill Athletic League (DFAL) which is under the guidance of the North Coast Section (NCS) of the California Interscholastic Federation, Las Lomas supports 25 varsity teams and 32 JV or Frosh teams.
