

Common Myths

Myth: One Mistake Can Ruin the Chances of Acceptance:

Myth: Applying for Financial Aid Is Too Complicated:

- Reality: While the financial aid process may seem daunting, there are resources available, such as the FAFSA, to make it more manageable. It's essential to understand the deadlines and gather necessary documents.

Myth: The College You Attend Dictates Your Career Path:

- Reality: While college experiences can shape opportunities, students have the power to create their own paths. Success is determined by one's dedication, skills, and willingness to pursue opportunities.

Myth: The Essay Must Be Extraordinary and Unique:

- Reality: While a strong essay is important, it doesn't need to be overly dramatic or unique to be effective. Authenticity, clarity, and showcasing the student's personality and experiences are more important.

My child is a senior - what should I be doing?

- **Encourage** your student to utilize the resources on campus -
 - College & Career, Academy, 6th and/or 7th Period, Counselor, College Visits
- **Share** information you get via the Daily Don and the APC Newsletter, and emails from the College & Career
- **Limit** “College Talk” at home
 - Maybe schedule a time each week to touch base on progress
- **Complete** the Parent Statement in Naviance (if your student needs a counselor letter of recommendation)
- **Plan** college tours if possible
 - Even just local schools to get a better idea of size, and atmosphere
- **Think** about what paying for college looks like for your family
- **Check emails with your students to make sure you aren't missing anything**

Application Deadlines/Details

Common App

- Nov 1 - first set of applications due (with a few exceptions)
- Deadlines vary depending on Early Action, Early Decision and Regular Decision
- 650 word main essay
- Many colleges have supplemental writing

UC App

- Due Nov 30
- 4 short paragraphs & 20 activities/awards
- No Letters of Recommendation
- No SAT/ACT

Direct to Institution Apps

- Dates vary by school
- Some roll out their admission decisions to applying early can be helpful

CSU App

- Oct 1 - Application opens
- Due Nov 30
- No Essay
- No Letters of Recommendation
- No Activities
- Complete the app in the C&C Center (takes about an hour)

What is WUE??

WUE is a tuition-savings program that makes attending participating Western out of state schools more affordable. Students pay 150% (or less) of in-state tuition (saves and average of \$10,895/year)

- Each participating school has its own requirements (check on their websites or with Ms. Levy)
- Common WUE schools for Acalanes students - Colorado State, Washington State, University of Nevada Reno, Boise State, Northern Arizona, University of Hawaii Manoa, Montana State, University of Utah, Utah State

Demonstrated Interest?

Demonstrated interest is the measurement of how much a student has shown their desire to attend a particular college.

- More common with private schools
- Students can email and connect with admissions reps (easy to find on the school's admission section)
 - These reps are often the first to read an application
 - It is helpful to reach out to the admissions rep before a tour and ask a question not easily found on the website - "Where is a good place to grab lunch after our tour?", "Is there a place on campus we should be sure to see that is not part of the tour?"
 - If a rep visits Acalanes, students can send a thank you email following up on any questions they may still have
 - Admissions reps want to help - reach out, let them know you

FAFSA - December this year

The [FAFSA](#) opens December 2023. Both students and parents **must** create a Student Aid Account to get an FSA ID before completing the form.

How FAFSA changes will impact students

FAFSA is used to determine eligibility for federal and state financial aid. Colleges also use the information to determine need for institutional aid.

Note - there are some Private Universities that require the [CSS Profile](#)

Scholarships

- **Merit Aid from Institution** - the best financial aid comes directly from the college
 - It is guaranteed for all 4 years (GPA requirement needs to be met)
- **WUE** - Guaranteed for all 4 years (GPA requirement needs to be met)
- **Local Scholarships**
 - Applicant Pool is much smaller
 - One time gifts ranging from a few hundred dollars to a few thousand

Other Deadline Information

Wake Forest offers both Early Decision and Early Action in addition to Regular Decision. Early Decision (I or II) is a binding agreement, whereas our Early Action program (for First-Generation students only) is non-binding. Most scholarships (including full-cost scholarships) do not require a separate merit-based scholarship application. Instead, students need only submit a complete Early Action, Early Decision, Early Decision II, or Regular Decision application by November 15. Finalists for scholarships that require more comprehensive interviews or auditions will be notified by the end of March.

Should we be considering Community College???

Main reasons for attending Community College:

- Transfer Agreement Programs with UCs and CSUs
- Free tuition for full-time first time students for 2 years/Affordability
- A great way to ease into college and complete general ed coursework
- Fill out FAFSA to get 2 years free at most colleges
- Applications are not due until Spring

Registering for AP Classes

Step One: Enter Join Code on CollegeBoard.org before Nov.10th

- Join Codes will be given to you by your AP Teacher. It is Specific to your Class Period.
- If you are NOT enrolled in an AP Class but would like the option to take the Exam, see the Testing Coordinator (Nicole Singleterry) for a Join Code. Must be done before November 10th

Step Two: Purchase your Exam on the Acalanes webstore by Nov 10. Each Exam is \$110

Exam dates: May 6-May 17

Students with testing accommodations need to see Ms. Singleterry by November 1.
