

Course Selection

- An opportunity to practice decision making.

Course Selection Timeline

- Academy sessions are available for students to learn about class choices at their next grade level.
- Aeries PASS will be open from January 19 February 8 to enter course selections online.
- Counselor classroom presentations will be January 19th, 20th, 24th, and 25th.
- Jan 26th is Course Preview Night (OPEN HOUSE) to get more information and ask questions about classes. Parents and students are invited.
- Students turn in course requests by appointment Jan 30
 -Feb 8

Open House is not just for parents!

- Students planning to take 2 or more AP classes must attend a session on time management at Open House.
- It's a great time to get more information about course expectations.

Course Selection Timeline

• Students will meet with their counselor for a brief (5 min) appointment to review their selections. Students will receive a sticker on their course selection form with their specific appt date/time!

All students must:

1. Complete and submit their grade level <u>course selection</u> <u>sheet</u> (with parent/guardian signature!) by the deadline.

AND

2. Request the corresponding classes <u>online</u> through Aeries.

 - 9th grade: 30 credits or more AND no F grades
 - 10th grade: 90 credits or more AND no F grades
- Check for any D or F grades in required courses.
 - Students can remediate grades (talk to counselor)

Discuss future goals and post-high school options.

- 4 year colleges: A-G subject requirements, grades of C- or higher are needed for admissions.
- 2 year colleges: no A-G subject requirements,
 grades of D- or higher are needed for admissions.


Math Pathways

Sophomore Year Classes

(Current 9th graders)

Required:

- English 2
- Chemistry of the Earth will be preloaded for students, talk to counselor about any concerns.
- Math: Will be entered for you on Aeries based on math teacher's recommendation.
- Human and Social development (HSD)- 1 semester
- 1 semester of elective to be taken to balance HSD class.

Choices:

- PE: yoga, weights, or sports (Athletic PE)
- Social Science is not required in 10th grade, but many students choose AP Euro or Contemporary Issues (CIPP).
- World Language or elective

Entering classes in Aeries

- Your recommended math class will be entered for you.
- Sophomores will be pre-enrolled in English, Chemistry and Human Social Development.
- Sophomores need to pick a semester class to fill the time they are not in Human Social Development
- Remember to put in alternates.
- If you are planning on using AHS sports for PE credit, you can sign up for Athletic PE in addition to your 7 class periods.



Semester-Long Class Options

PE Yoga

Counts toward required PE credits

Students will learn the basic skills of a yoga practice and an understanding of yoga etiquette and terminology. Students will work toward a health-enhancing level of physical fitness. Students will develop Skills, knowledge, and interest to independently maintain a regular yoga practice. Students will gain an understanding of individual differences and acquire a non-competitive, positive self-image in regard to their own body and yoga practice Students will learn the Immediate and long term benefits of yoga practice.

PE Weight-training

Counts toward required PE credits

Students learn the fundamentals of weight training with emphasis on body development and maintenance as well as safety factors involved in strength conditioning. Students will be introduced to basic training principles, Olympic lifting movements, application of anatomy of movements as related to weight training, strength training, aerobic training, overall fitness training and conditioning. Students will demonstrate how to make wise choices, meet challenges, and develop positive behaviors in fitness, wellness, and movement activities for a lifetime.

Semester-Long Class Options

Intro to Ethnic Studies College preparatory elective

Ethnic Studies operates from the consideration that race and racism have been, and continue to be, profoundly powerful social and cultural forces in American society. The major purpose of this course is to educate students to be politically, socially, and economically conscious about their personal connections to history. Ethnic Studies focuses on themes of social justice, social responsibility, and social change. This course will span from past to present and allow students to identify social patterns and universal qualities present in all ethnic/cultural aspects of society including their own.

- No consideration of extracurriculars, no essays, no letters of recommendation



- student must be 1st time college student

Available at most community colleges.


Summer Opportunities



FAQ

- What is an AP class?
 - AP stands for Advanced Placement (college level). The class follows the AP content standards. There is a cumulative test created by AP/College Board at the end of the course that is optional. Some colleges give credit for a high score on the AP exam. Some colleges will waive intro level classes. AP classes require lots of reading and a high level of analytical thinking. AP tests are multiple choice plus timed essays, so lots of practice on those testing formats.
- What is the difference between an AP and Honors class?

 GPA grade boost for both. AP is college level to prep for AP exam in May. AP often gives college credit. Honors is a designation that is only within our school district. Honors courses are an extra challenge and depth beyond college-preparatory.

FAQ

- What if my student takes a course during summer or outside of AHS?
 - Summer school classes through the district are for remediation (D/F grades) only in required courses. The student must sign up to be enrolled in the class.
 - While taking a class for enrichment can be a great opportunity, be aware that courses taken at other schools/colleges will not appear on the Acalanes transcript. All graduation requirements must be taken at Acalanes. Be sure that the school offering the class is fully accredited and issues an official transcript. Talk to your counselor about any specific situations you are considering.
- If my student changes their mind after they turn in their course selection form, can they still change their classes?
 - Maybe. The number of courses we offer is based on the sign-ups in February. We cannot guarantee space available later. Ask your counselor to add your request to the Wish list. Students can submit a request to change, but we cannot guarantee the change can be made.
