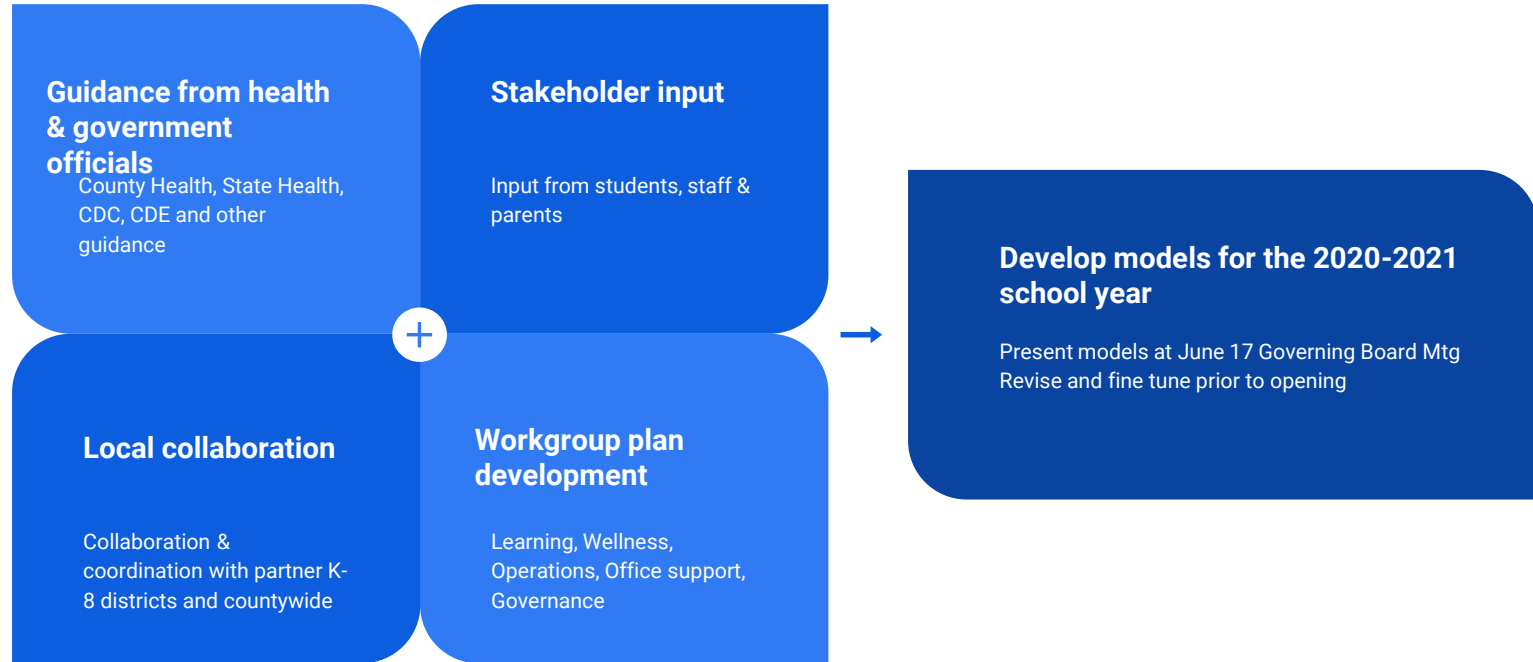

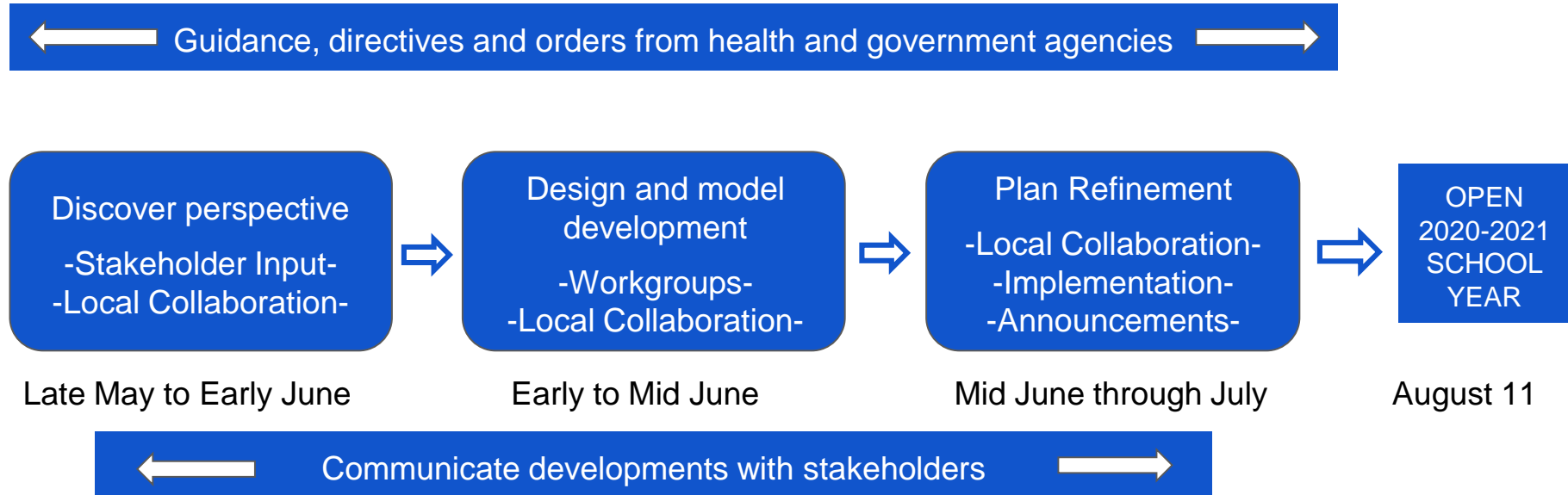

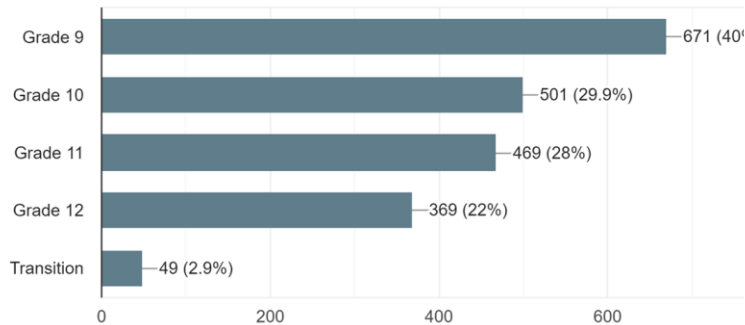


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Parent survey - May 28 - June 1

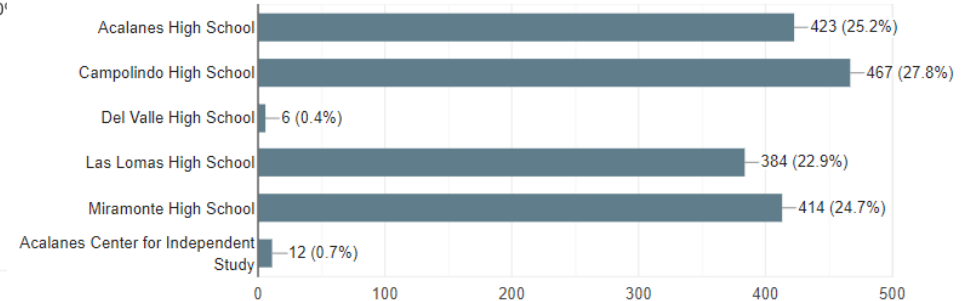
Select the grade level(s) of your high school student(s)

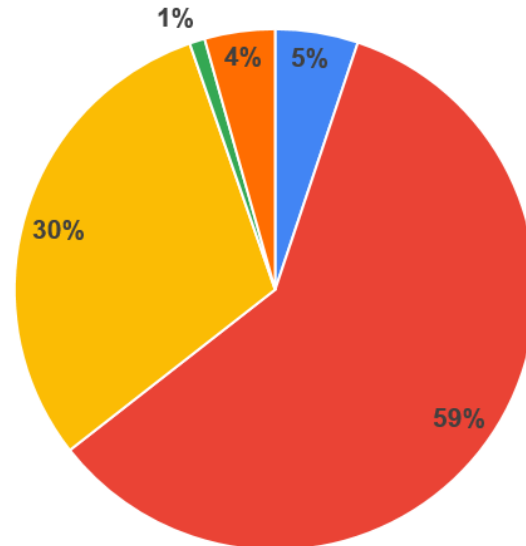


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Parent survey:

In a pre-COVID-19 vaccine environment, will you send your student(s) to school in August 2020?

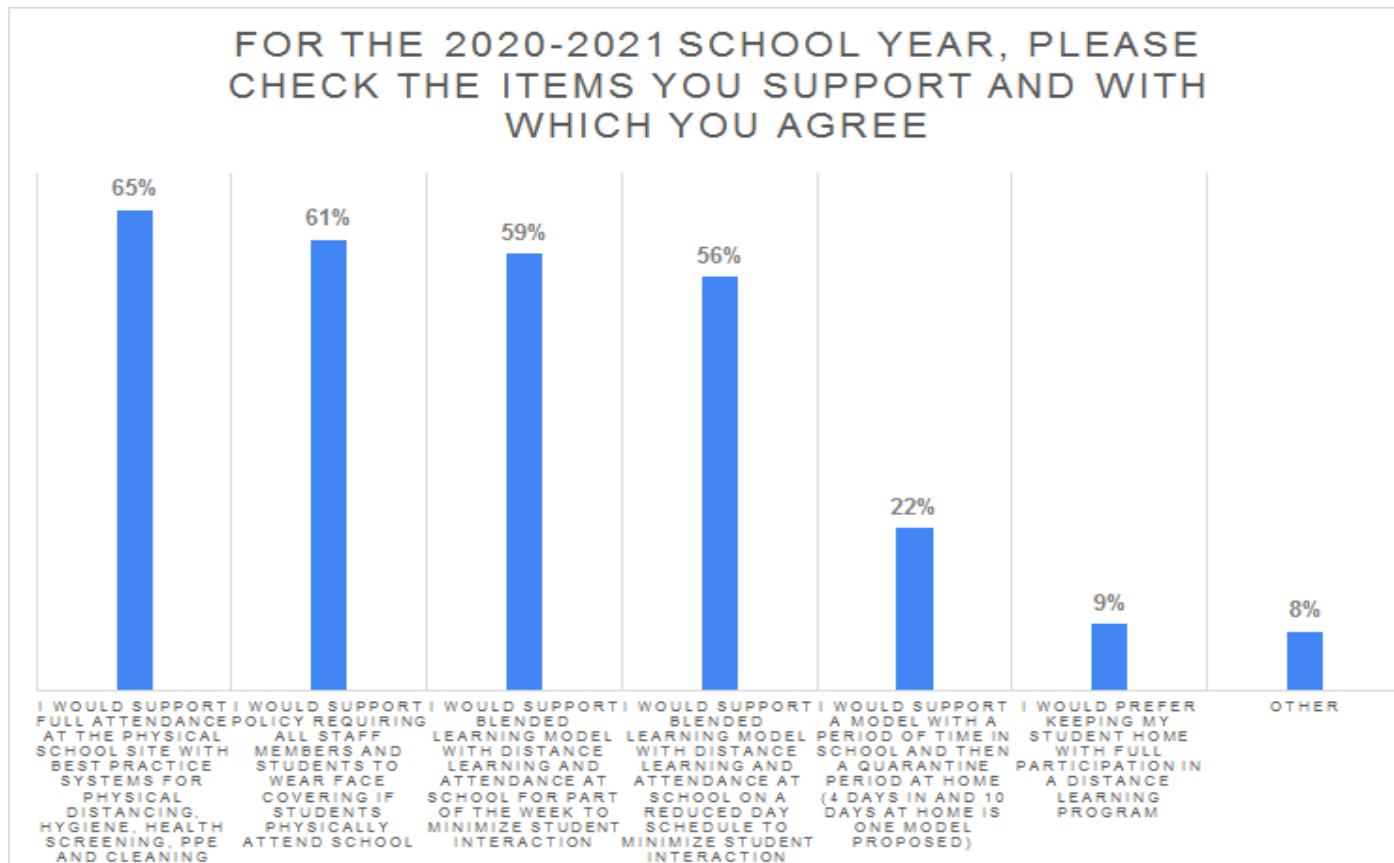

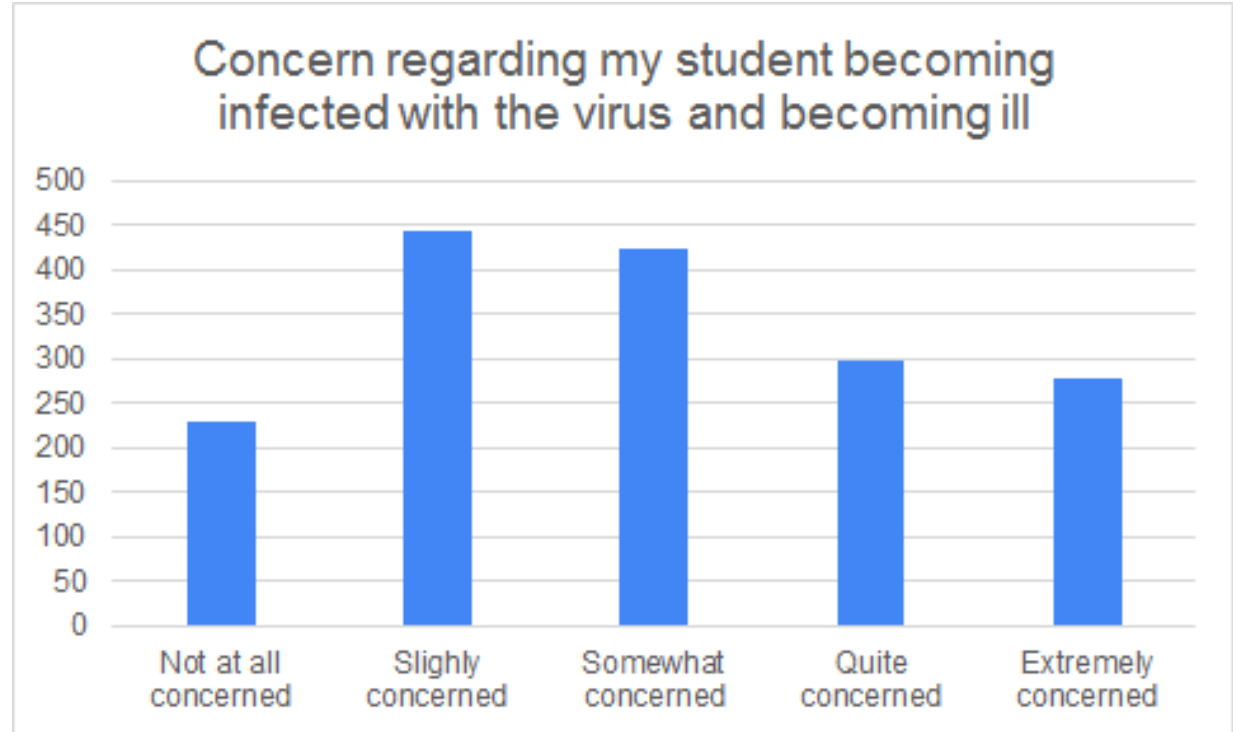

These are concerns parents have raised about their children attending school in a pre-COVID-19 vaccine environment.

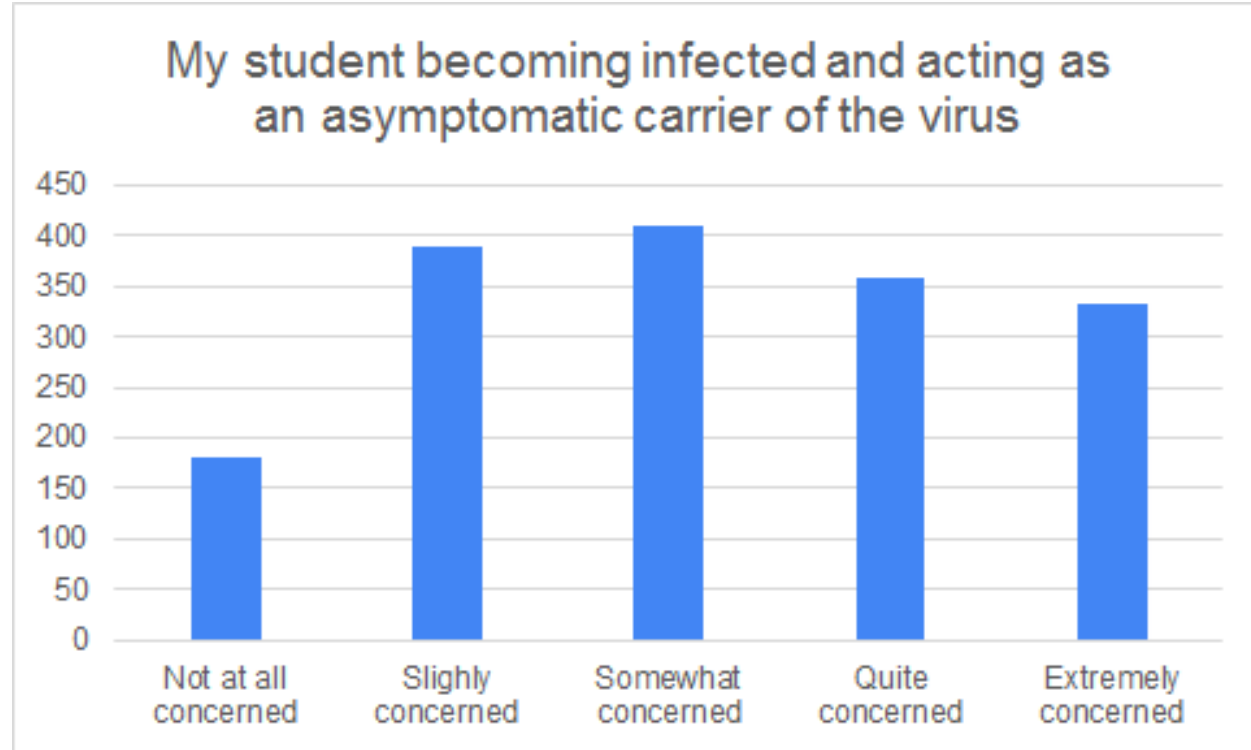




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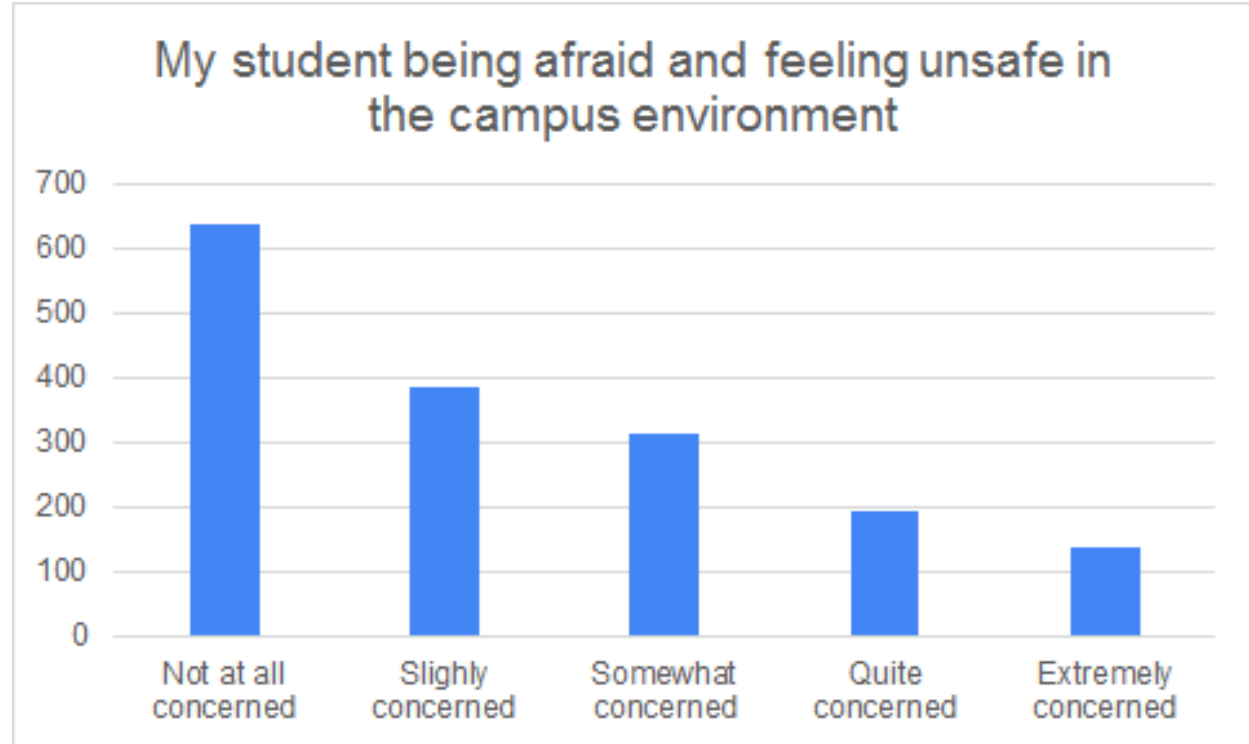




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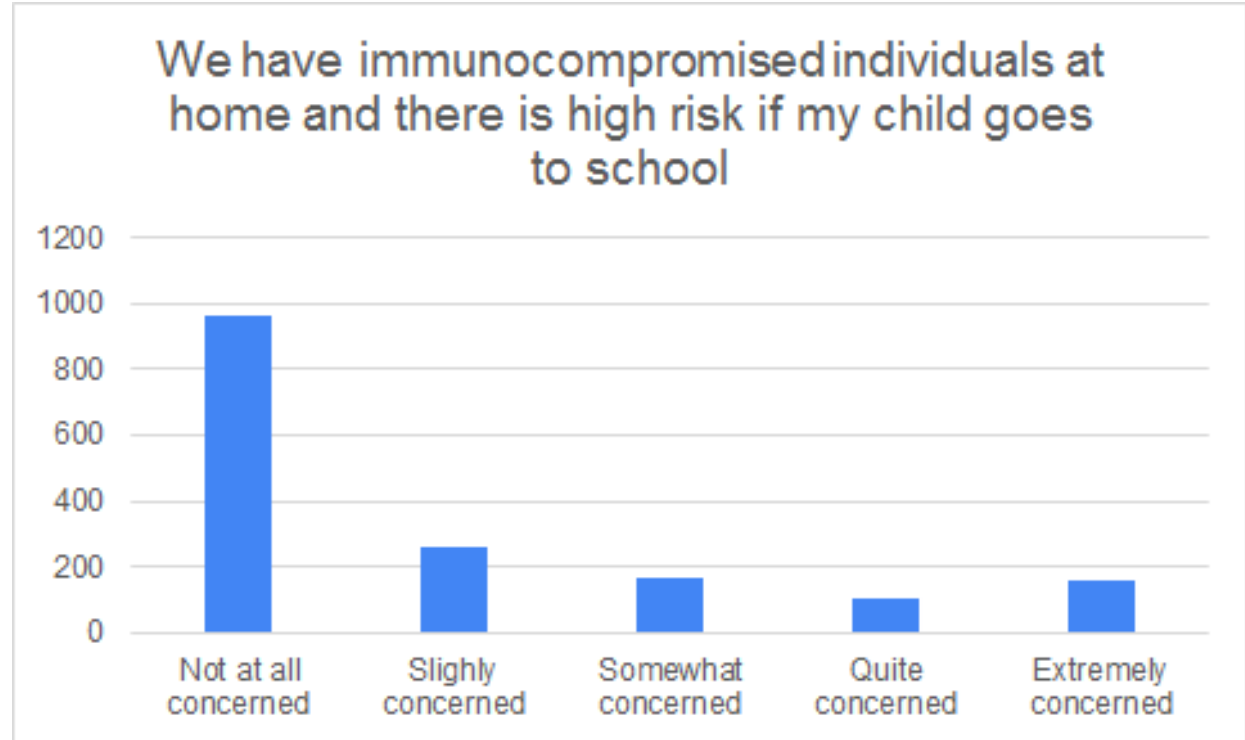




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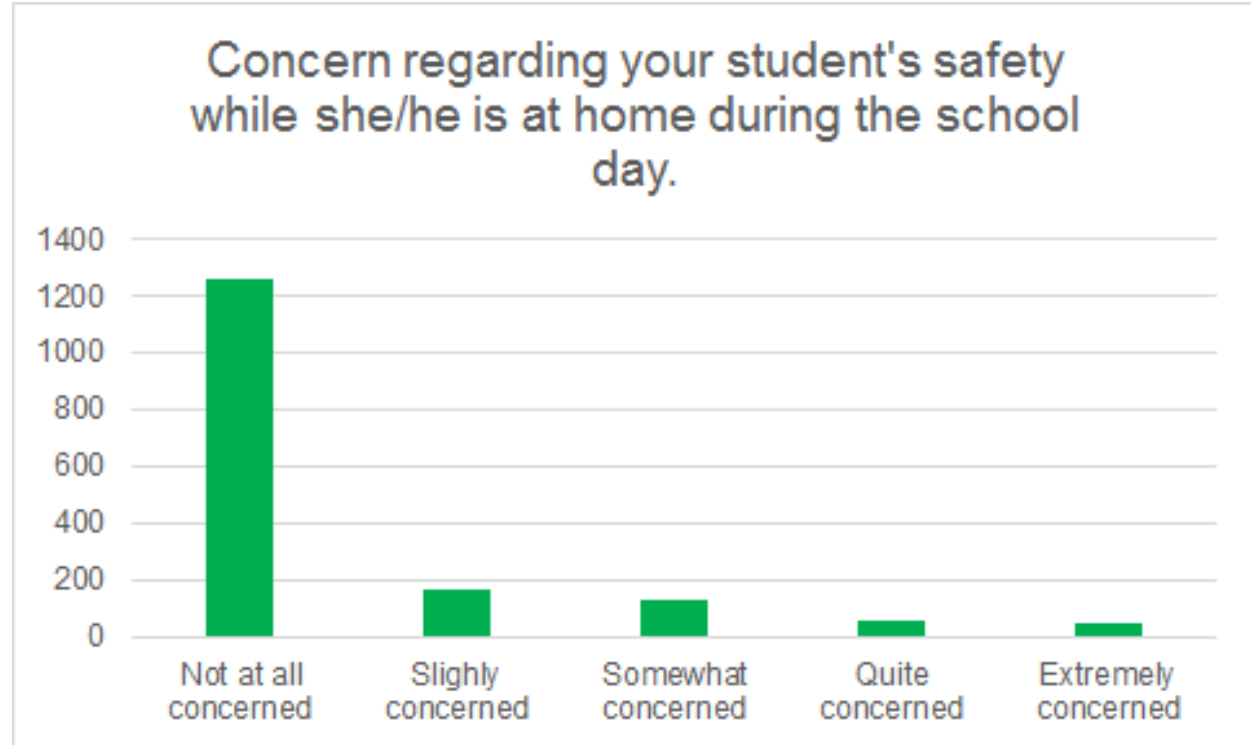

These are concerns parents have raised about their children not being physically in school full-time due to COVID-19.

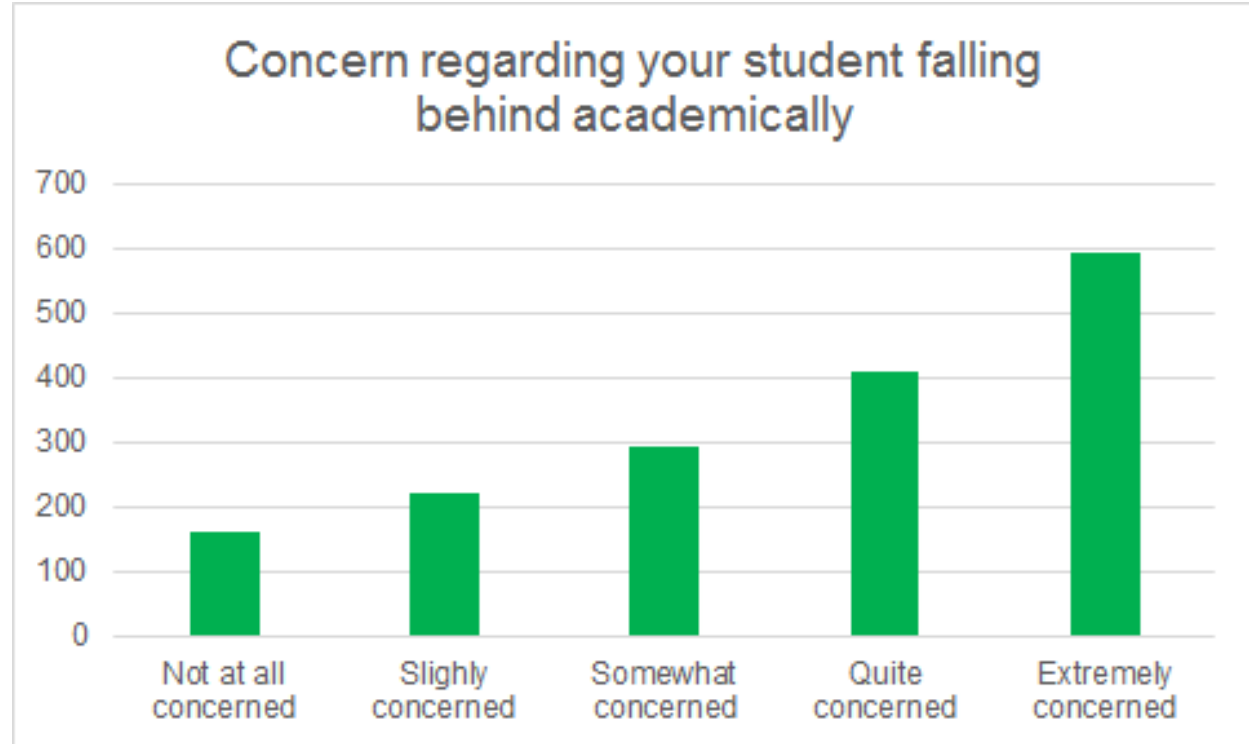




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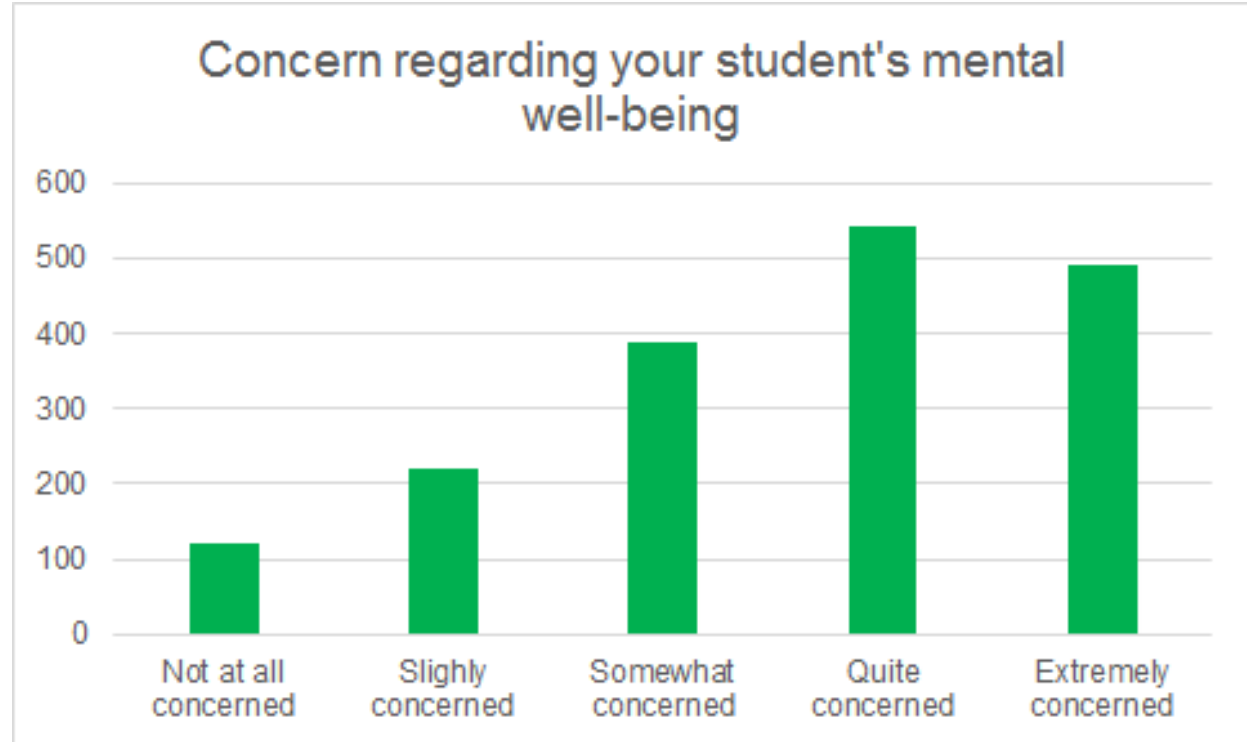




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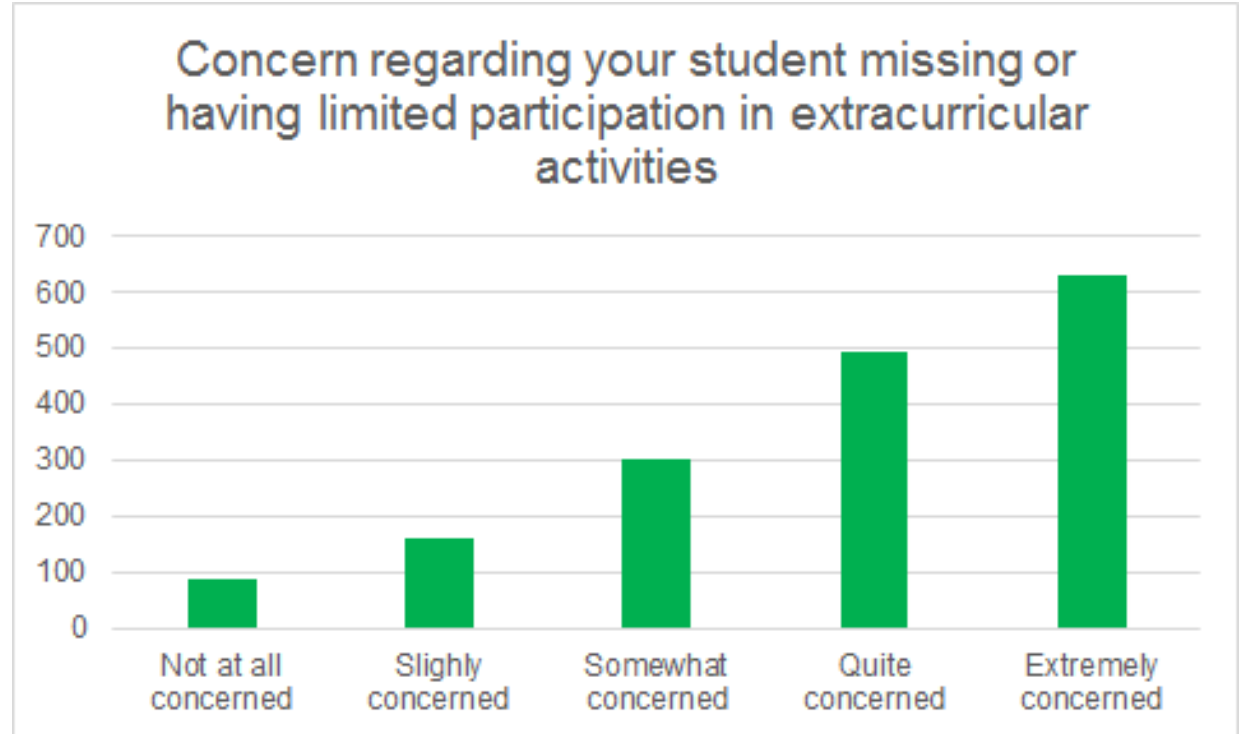




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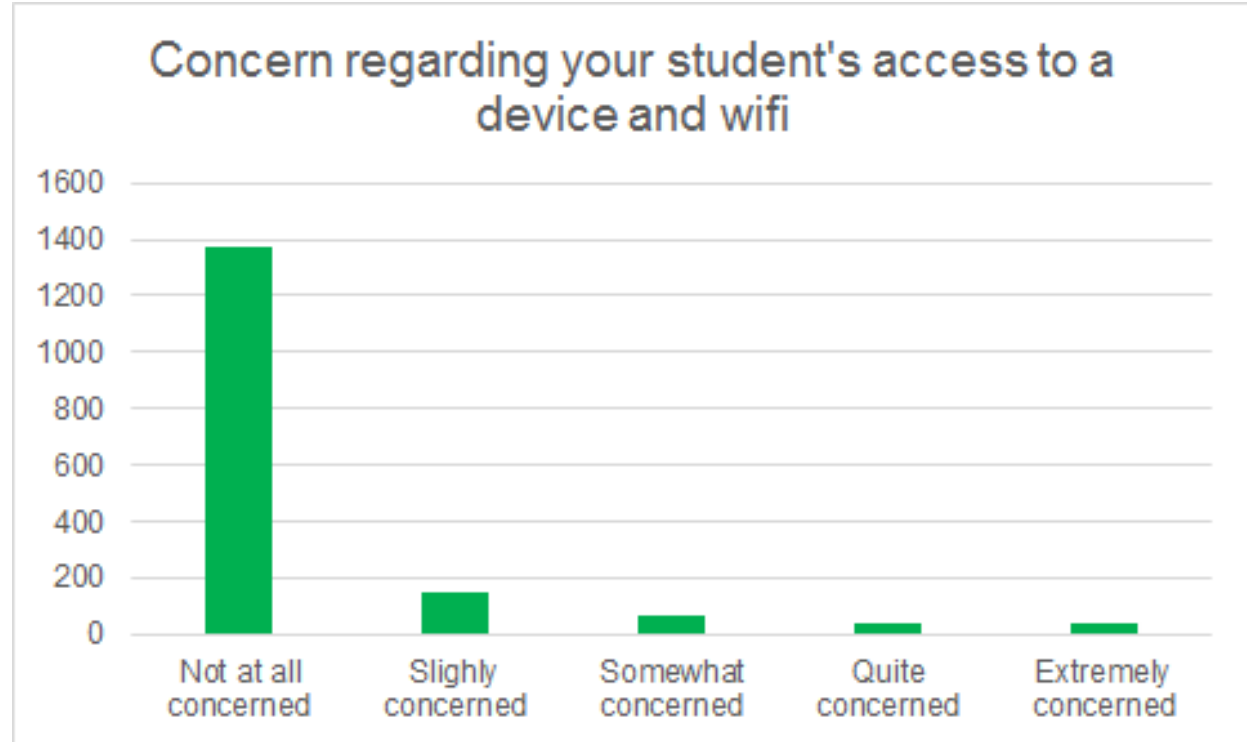




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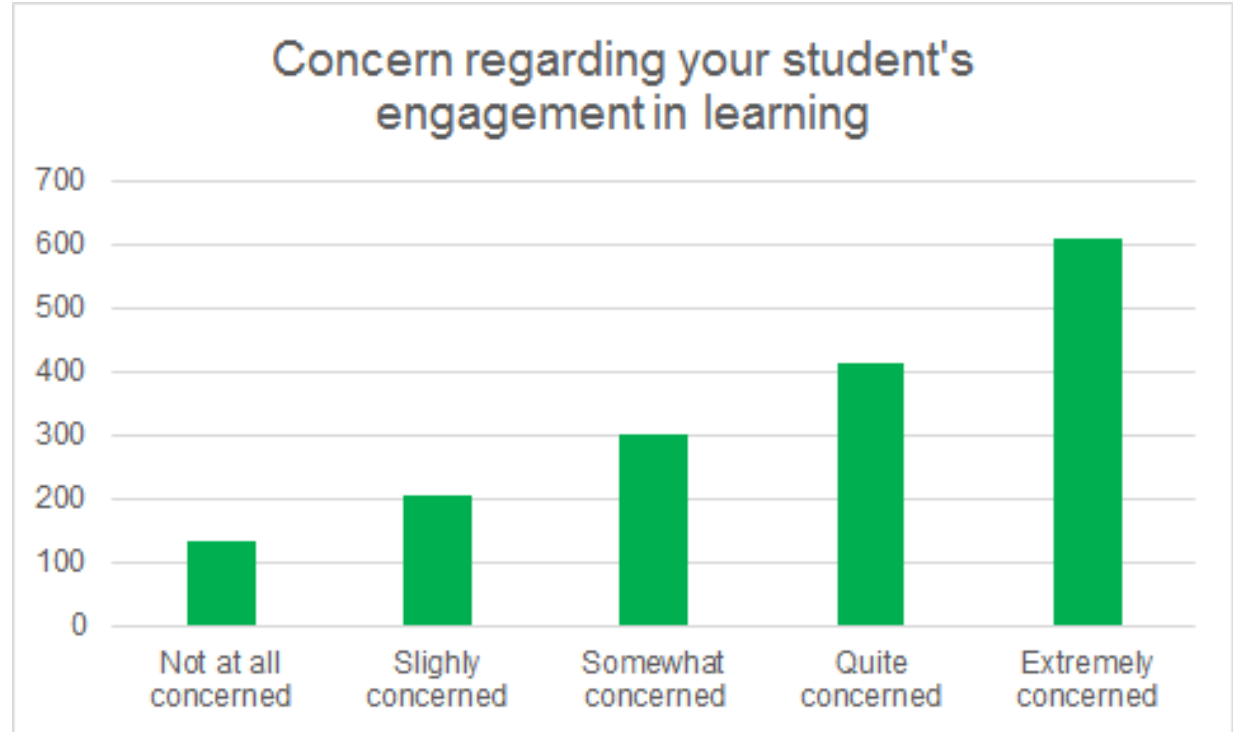




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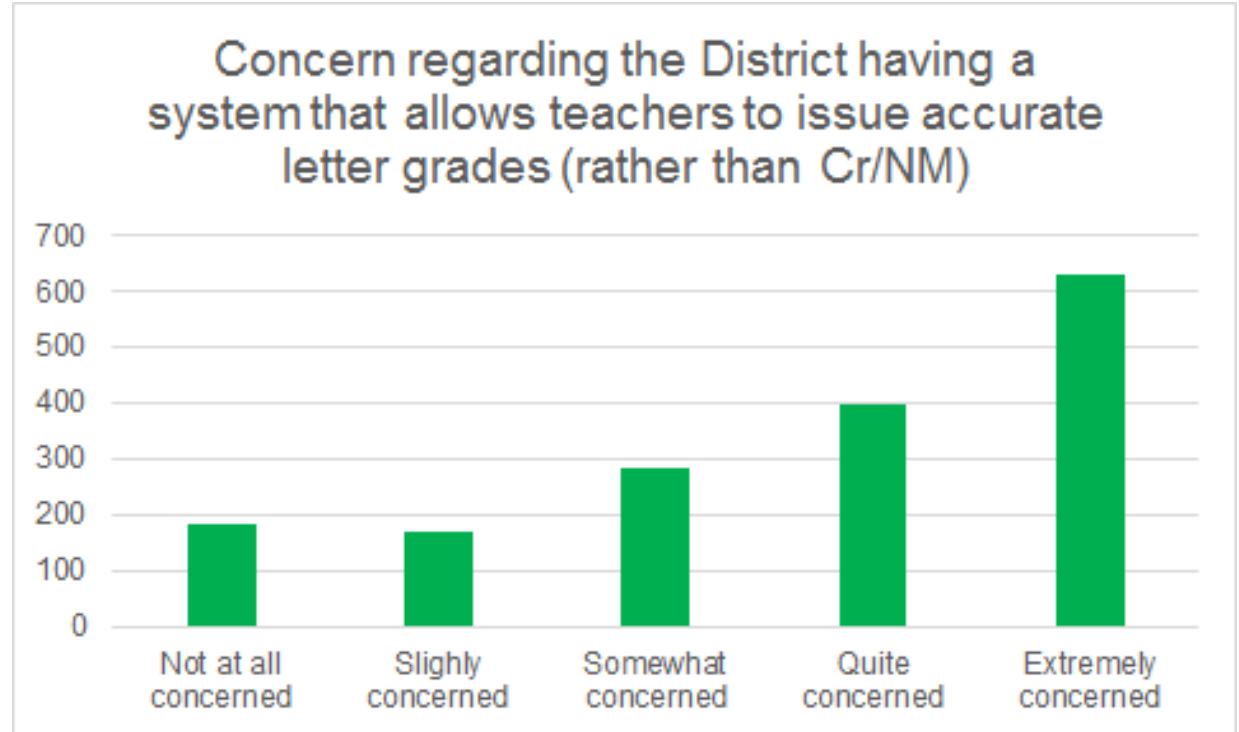




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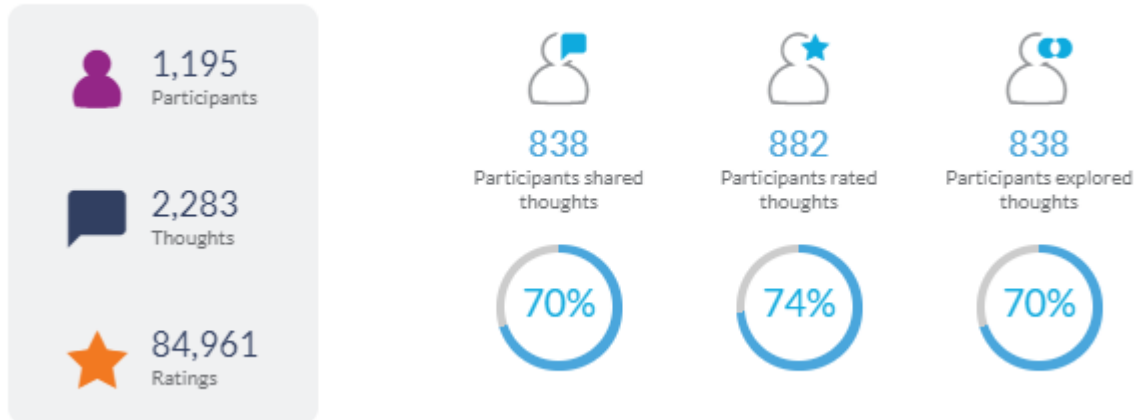

What are the most important considerations for AUHSD as we design plans to reopen schools the 2020-2021 school year?

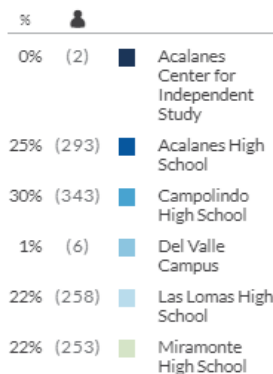




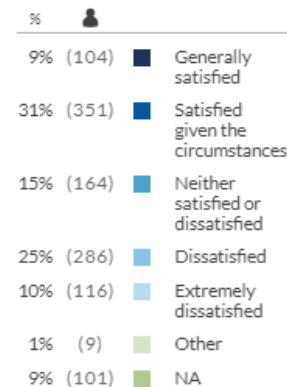

Equity Across Teaching

Live, synchronous teaching should be required IF any distance learning occurs Far more effective than the passive, assign reading and homework methods in spring.

CDC Interim Guidance

Should you consider opening?

- ✓ Will reopening be consistent with applicable state and local orders?
- ✓ Is the school ready to protect children and employees at higher risk for severe illness?
- ✓ Are you able to screen students and employees upon arrival for symptoms and history of exposure?

Are recommended health and safety actions in place?

- ✓ Promote healthy hygiene practices such as hand washing and employees wearing a cloth face covering, as feasible
- ✓ Intensify cleaning, disinfection, and ventilation
- ✓ Encourage social distancing through increased spacing, small groups and limited mixing between groups, if feasible
- ✓ Train all employees on health and safety protocols

Is ongoing monitoring in place?

- ✓ Develop and implement procedures to check for signs and symptoms of students and employees daily upon arrival, as feasible
- ✓ Encourage anyone who is sick to stay home
- ✓ Plan for if students or employees get sick
- ✓ Regularly communicate and monitor developments with local authorities, employees, and families regarding cases, exposures, and updates to policies and procedures
- ✓ Monitor student and employee absences and have flexible leave policies and practices
- ✓ Be ready to consult with the local health authorities if there are cases in the facility or an increase in cases in the local area

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Learning - essential tasks

- Curriculum and delivery models
- Pedagogy and instructional practices
- Assessment and grading
- Schedule

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Wellness - essential tasks

- Student mental and physical health
- Staff mental and physical health
- School climate
- Communicating services and safety protocols
- Support for parents



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Office Support - essential tasks

- Traffic flow through the offices and general PPE
- Physical layouts that need changing to ensure safety
- Procedural changes - online forms, etc.
- Communication to students, staff and parents



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Operations – essential tasks

- Supplies: Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), hand sanitizing stations, disinfectant wipes
- Food Service - move to cashless system, prepare grab & go meals
- HVAC system, optimize air quality through filters & air exchange
- Collaborate with custodial on cleaning to assure air quality
- Develop shared responsibilities protocol to ensure student and staff safety
- Prepare to respond to the needs of school by adjusting and aligning services to meet the need
